FIN does FINGS for Ferrets!

Although ferrets from certain foreign countries will be allowed to travel into Britain from the 3rd July 2004 onwards without being guarantined for 6 months on arrival. the Department for Environment. Food and Rural Affairs (defra) has still not issued auidelines on the requirements for ferret travel. Consequently, a member of FIN contacted Beverly Hughes MP to see if something could be done to pressurise defra into clarifying the requirements as soon as possible.

Ben Bradshaw, the Minister for Nature Conservation and Fisheries, outlined the envisaged requirements in a reply to Beverley Hughes, the text of which is reproduced opposite. So a little progress has been made.

and people who want to bring their ferrets into the UK now have some idea of what to do to prepare their ferret for immigration into the UK.

"Thank you Beverly for caring about all creatures great and small"

(Editors note: we weren't sure about allowing the use of the word 'immigration' in case this led to a flood of complaints about asylum seeking ferrets! However, we decided that any incoming New Zealand ferrets could be classed as political refugees; since ferrets were banned in New Zealand earlier this year they're now being hunted to death by extremist groups.)

From the Minister for Nature Conservation and Fisheries

Ben Bradshaw MP, 11th November 2003

'The EU Regulation on the non-commercial movement of pet animals will apply from 3rd July 2004. From this date we expect that, in terms of rabies requirements, ferrets entering the UK from EU Member States and "low risk" third countries will have to be first microchipped and then vaccinated. It is also envisaged that ferrets from these countries will have to be treated against ticks and tapeworms between 24 and 48 hours before checking in with an approved transport company on an approved route into the UK. These details will need to be recorded in an official passport (if the animal enters from another Member State) or an official certificate (if the animal enters from a "low risk" third country) issued by a government-approved vet. The relevant document will need to accompany the animal on its journey into the UK. Ferrets entering the UK from "high risk" countries will still have to undergo six months quarantine.

'Although the above is how we expect the system to operate, there are still some details which have not yet been agreed. When agreed, they will be published in Commission Regulations. We will not be publishing any literature on the new Scheme until we are sure of all the details.

Ferret Research

One of our members, Livi Parkins, conducted a ferret housing survey, and she's kindly provided a summary of her results below. Thanks Livi, and we're looking forward to hearing about the results of the maze learning work you did with FIN ferrets for your final year project. Our ferrets had great fun and really enjoyed the treats and the presents. They're wondering when you're coming back with even more treats:-)

Ferret Housing Survey

This summer I finished an HND in Welfare of Animals with Business Management. For my final year project I examined alternative housing regimes for pet ferrets. I decided to investigate this, as housing is a very important aspect of ferret keeping.

As a basis for the report, a questionnaire was sent to various ferret newsletters, sent out with Ferrets About orders and some were filled in via personal contact with friends and at FIN meetings.

The questionnaire examined how ferrets are housed, the size of housing and the amount of human contact received. It also asked the owner's opinion of the minimum and optimum size home for a ferret.

An impressive 74 questionnaires were returned; 46% from the UK and 49% from the USA. From this it was found that 69% of owners kept their ferrets inside, 22% were kept outside and 9% were housed both inside and out.

Choosing a home for the ferret is very important to ensure the health and well being of the animal, and the ease of responsible ownership. There are a variety of choices now available for ferret owners. The market has moved away from wooden hutches to aesthetically pleasing plastic cages. There is also the option of having ferrets free roaming in a room or throughout a house.

The results showed that it's important for ferrets to receive a high level of attention and care. Having a cage or specified area enables the ferret to

have somewhere safe to go if required. This is paramount if the ferrets are free roaming around the house. Their accommodation should be clean, dry and spacious with separate areas for sleeping and playing. The size of the cage should relate to the size and health of the ferret.

The most important fact to be considered when keeping a ferret is the amount of human contact it receives. Ferrets are social animals and unless handled regularly they are likely to become anti social.

Best of the Web

Following on from the unprecedented success of my previous 'Best of the Web', I've decided to be a little bit more controversial for this issue. So in this article I'm going to be looking at ferret healthcare Web sites.

I'm sure we're all aware of the issue of using Frontline™ to treat ear mites, which has sparked off some controversy within the ferret world during recent months. But to everyone who just wants a quiet life I'll immediately say don't worry; I won't be pursuing that issue in this column.

My first choice this month is Beeston Animal Health (http://www.wormers.co.uk). It's not ferret specific, or even particularly informative, but it does offer exceedingly good prices on ear cleaning products! I personally get Logic ear cleaner from them. The Web site has a clean appearance, is easily navigated, and is of course secure. So you don't need to worry about parting with your credit card details.

My second site is VetULike (http://www.vetulike.co.uk/), supported by the Medicom group of companies. It hosts a wealth of information on ferret related healthcare issues and should settle your mind should you fear for the worst in an unwell ferret. Of course, if you're worried about your ferret's health,

then you should take it to a vet immediately.

My third and final choice is PetEducation (http://www.peteducation.co.uk), an outstandingly large reference site comprising veterinary articles on just about any animal you can imagine. There's an entire section devoted to the domesticated ferret. But now it's time for the judge's decision

This issue's 'Best of the Web' award goes to PetEducation, primarily due to their absolutely fabulous library of pet health references.
